

Read Write Inc. – books information

As part of the Read Write Inc Programme we are really excited to have some lovely new reading books. The children will take home the same reading book that they read in their Phonics sessions. (This is a paper copy but please keep it in your child's bookbag so that we can use them again.) The children will have three different opportunities to read the book in school. The first read, your child will use their teaching stick (lollypop stick) to point to the words as they read and we will be focusing on accuracy. The second read, your child will be encouraged to read with more fluency and for the final read we want to hear the children read it in a Storyteller's voice. Prior to reading these books we spend time as a group looking at the words in the book and thinking about what they say and what they mean. We practise the words speedily before reading them in the book. This helps to increase the children's fluency once they come to read the book.

In the front cover, you will see a glossary of terms.

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The Story Green words are words that appear in the story that the children will be able to decode. We practise these before we read the book to help fluency. We use lots of expression and maybe an action, when appropriate, when reading these words.

Red words are words that are not always able to be decoded but are often found in early reading books. We practise these so that children can read them effortlessly. The children will practise with a partner, reading the words across the rows an then down the columns. We always challenge the children to challenge their friend too so they will point to the words in a random order and ask their friend to read. Then they will swap and the other child will read the words.

Red Words Ask children to practise reading the words across the rows, down the columns and in and out of order clearly and quickly.
